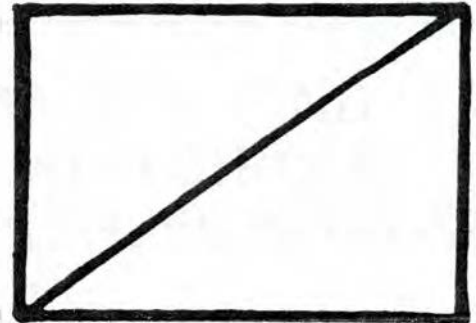
### St. Patrick's Hat

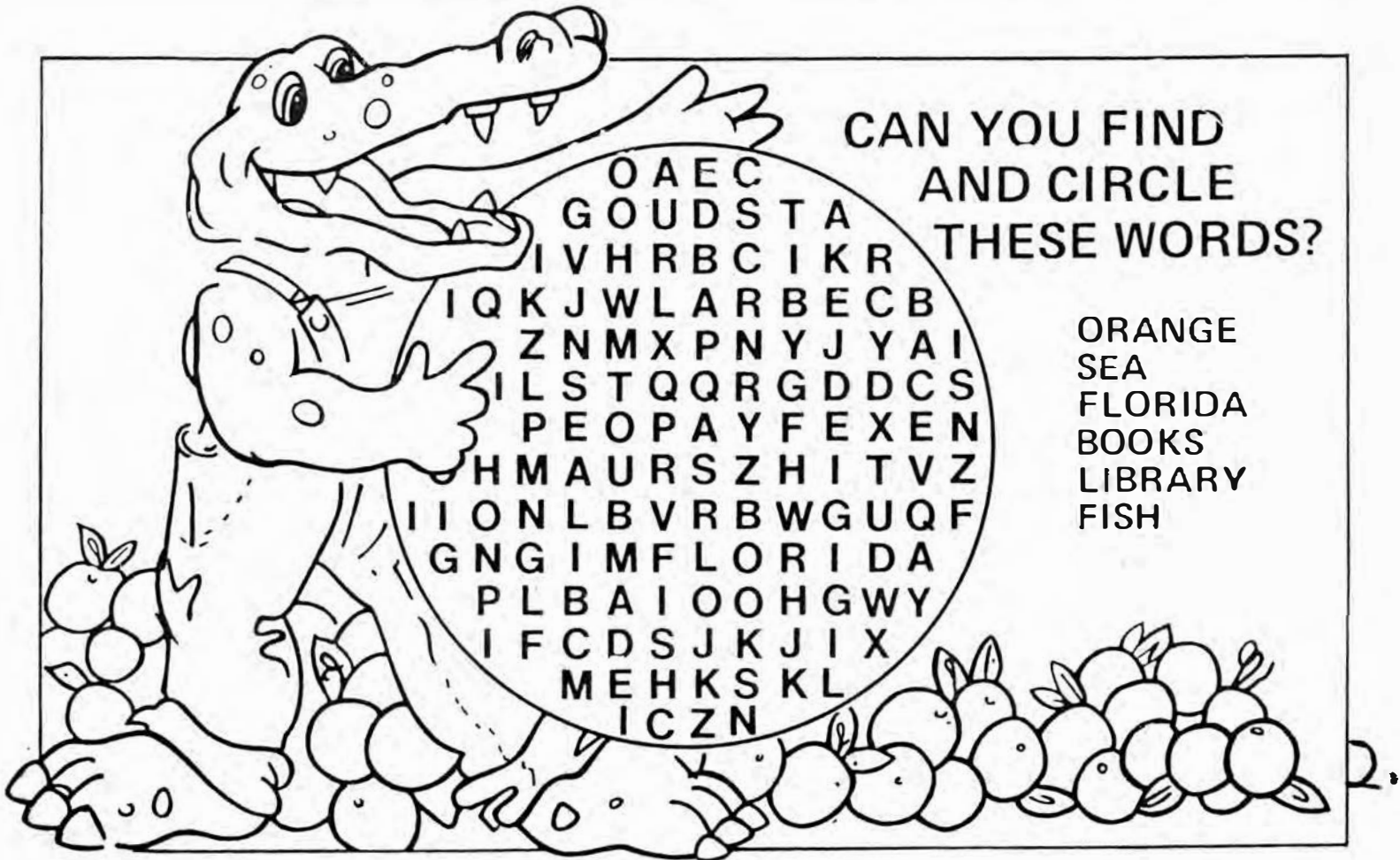

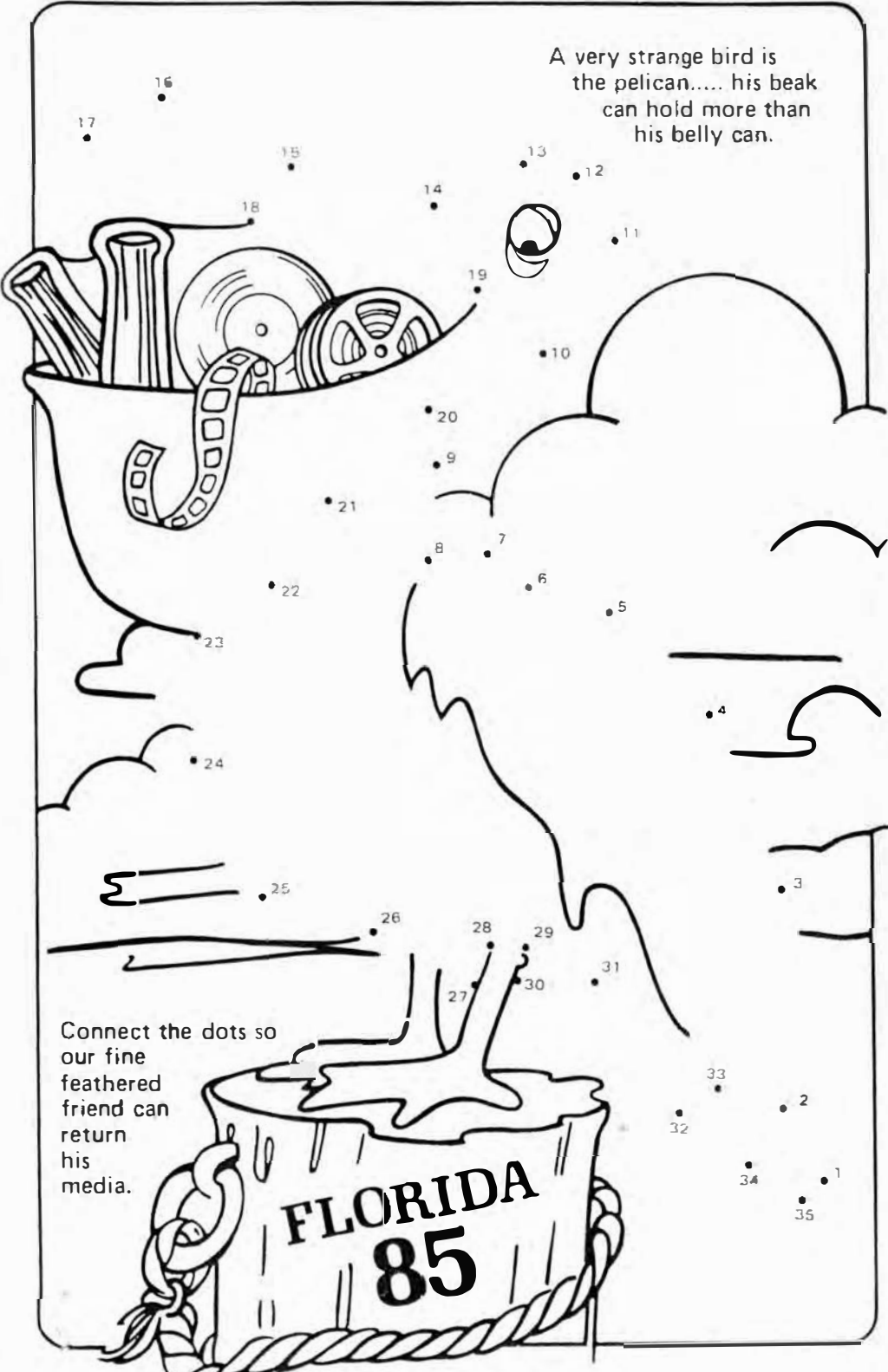

## Magic has magical effects on the disabled

Four years ago, David Copperfield started Project Magic, a program using magic as therapy for people who have disabilities, at the Daniel Freeman Memorial Hospital in Los Angeles. Since then, it has expanded to 500 hospitals in 30 countries.

### USA TODAY: How does Project Magic work?

COPPERFIELD: Magicians go into hospitals and teach magic to patients with the help of therapists to help patients regain dexterity and their coordination. Some people improve their mathematical, cognitive skills. It also boosts self-esteem by giving the disabled person a skill that an able-bodied person doesn't even have.

### USA TODAY: Where did the idea for this program come from?

COPPERFIELD: It started when I was corresponding with a young magician, asking for my advice. He sent a newspaper article about himself in a

wheelchair, and I was surprised; he had never mentioned that he was disabled. The reporter asked him, "Weren't the people surprised when you came rolling into the birthday show that you were hired for?" And he said, "That was their problem." Wow! It sounded like my childhood! I wasn't physically or mentally disabled, but in some ways I certainly was. Magic really helped me with my communication skills. I brought the idea to a hospital in California, and we designed magic to meet very specific goals: Magic that could help people who have movement in only one hand, magic that a quadriplegic can do, that blind people can do.

### USA TODAY: Now you're considering branching out with this idea?

COPPERFIELD: Project Magic will eventually become Project Music, Project Dance, Project Photography, and Project Puppetry. It will go into lots of different areas, using professionals from the entertainment world and put-

ting them with the medical community to organize programs that are medically sound and have therapeutic value.

### USA TODAY: Why does magic have therapeutic value?

COPPERFIELD: When people have a stroke or arthritis or have gotten into a car accident — their lives change. Their families suddenly don't know how to react to them. When they start doing magic, they have something to communicate with their families about. At a fund-raiser, this guy started giving me \$100 bills and told me that I had helped him get his father back. "My father had a stroke and he wouldn't go out of the house or talk to anybody — for two years," he said. But he started to do magic with his father, and they suddenly developed a rapport — something to share. He said, "You got my father back as my friend." And I said, "OK, I'll take these \$100 bills from you." (laughs)
