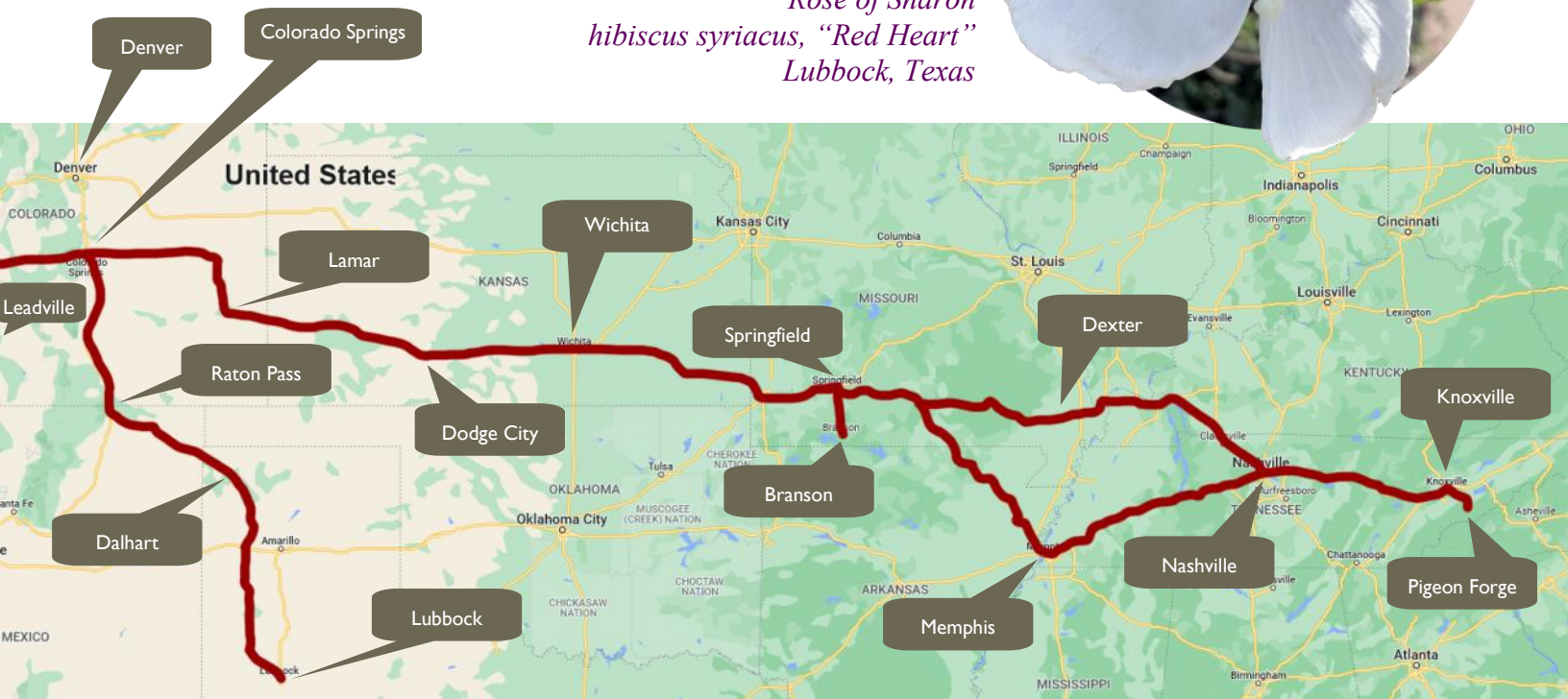
I'm working on getting information together in planning for a couple of other trips for the fall. Of course, reports of those trips will come out in issues after each respective trip.

Short Books of the Bible

For this issue, you get a double Word For Life!

Most of the books of the Bible have many chapters with many verses within each chapter. However, there are five books in the Bible that have no chapters at all! One book, *Obadiah*, is in the Old Testament, while four books are in the New Testament, *Philemon*, *II John*, *III John*, and *Jude*. And even with that, they all have 25 verses or less. I thought it would be fun to discuss each of these five books and see what each one is all about. Let's start with **Philemon**.

Philemon is a "beloved friend and fellow laborer" [1] of Paul and Timothy. It appears that Philemon, Apphia, and Archippus have a church in his house, possibly a small enough group to fit within a house in an unknown location in the first Century AD. Paul mentions his thanks and joy in that the "hearts of the saints have been refreshed" [7] by Philemon because of his love and sharing of his faith towards the people there. Paul wanted to be very respectful and courteous to Philemon regarding a bold request that Paul hoped Philemon would voluntarily accept instead of it being thrust upon him out of obligation. [8, 9, 14] With the letter, Paul is sending Onesimus to Philemon and requesting that he receive him the same as he would receive Paul. We don't know much about Onesimus, especially since he is only mentioned in one other place in Colossians, but it would appear that he might have been outcasted at one point from Paul's words of "who once was unprofitable to you" [11] and "perhaps he departed for a while for this purpose, that you might receive him forever, no longer as a slave". [15-16] It would appear that Onesimus might have done Philemon wrong in the past with Paul's assumption that "if he has wronged you or owes anything, put that on my account" [18] with Paul more than willing to pay for the debt. Paul also reminds Philemon, almost selfishly, that Philemon "owe me even your own self", [19] for perhaps Paul saved his life or got him out of some sort of trouble. Whatever the case, Paul is confident that Philemon "will do even more than I say" [21] and hopes for reconciliation between Philemon and Onesimus. The last verses are greeting from those with Paul.

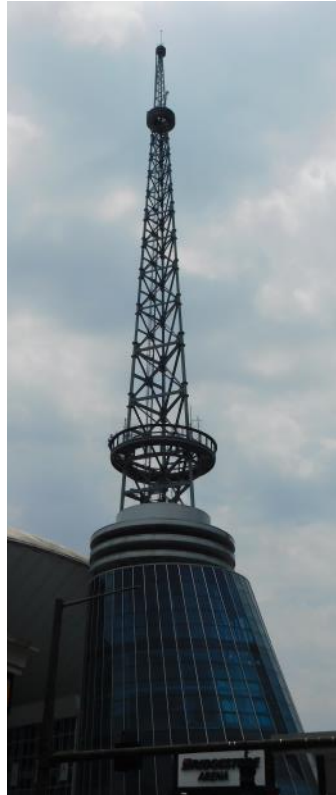

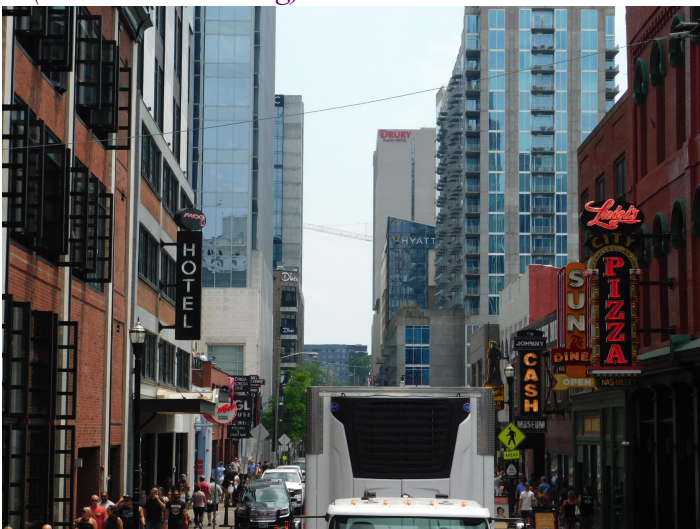

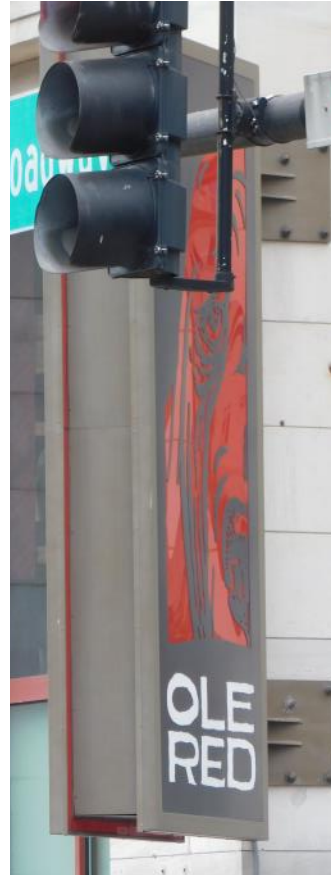

After fighting the traffic again on the main roads, we got downtown just before some strong storms hit near where we were. I ended up driving in circles four times to get back to the parking lot where we parked before because of various construction zones and the many oneways. By this point, it was 7:00 PM and the rain was getting heavy. The cops had blocked off part of Broadway, apparently something they do regularly to keep the drunk pedestrians safe at night! (You know they are not sober on a Saturday night!) The evening tour was on a single level trolley bus with rolled down clear plastic sides. This tour was more detailed and expanded on what the other tour told us. With it as evening, we would see a different aspect of the town with it all lit up. However, the rain never did stop, and the “clear” sides of the trolley were very difficult to see clearly through. All we could see were colors, shapes, and streaks, but zero clarity. For our own safety as well as to stay dry, the driver, who was also the guide, left the sides down for the entire tour, but also hoped that it would stop raining to put up the sides. It certainly would have been better if it was a clear night, but oh well. We did have one stop where we could get out, even though there was still light rain. We stopped at the Parthenon for photos of it lit up at night. After we got back to where we loaded, we went back to the car and briefly drove back to the same spot to get some photos pointed down Broadway with everything lit up. From there, we drove back to the Opryland area.

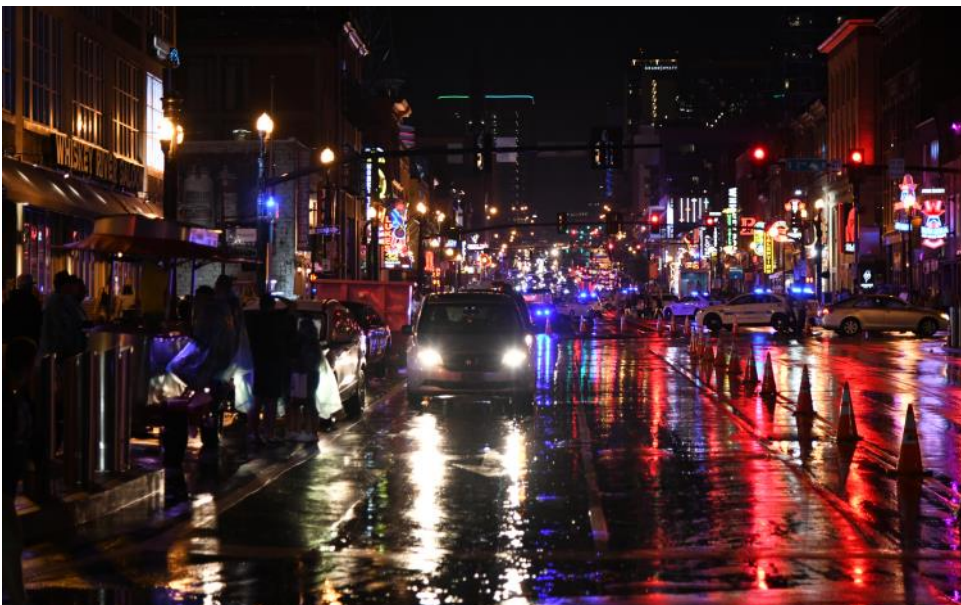

The Opryland area included not just the Grand Ole Opry, but a whole development of a mall, free standing stores and restaurants (like Paula Deen's Family Kitchen), a river cruise boat ramp, and the Gaylord Opryland Resort and Mall. When we found out that the Gaylord mall had a Carvel, Dad wanted to go get some of their ice cream. However, the place was very exclusive and required a parking fee of \$33 beyond the first free 20 minutes. We decided that it was not worth the money and skipped it. Since

it was rather late, the only option we could find was an open McDonald's for sundaes. There was a line in the drive through, and it took so long to get through it. For a short time, we thought that maybe the employees skipped working or that maybe it was only one person working! We ate the sundaes in the parking lot and went back to the room. We eventually ate the banana puddings too. Yes, we had two desserts! (The banana pudding would not have been as good the next day. Bananas get mushy fast.)

Last Tours—Sunday, May 22, 2022

After we got cleaned up and ate some breakfast, we packed up our bags and loaded up the car. We had a few things we wanted to do before we left Nashville. Dad still wanted to go on the backstage tour of the Opry. So, we went over to the Grand Ole Opry back to their ticket office to see when we could take the tour, which ran every 15 minutes. Unfortunately, they were booked solid until 4 o'clock. We knew that we did not want to wait around that long knowing that there was about a four hour drive to Knoxville then to Pigeon Forge, our next destination. What we did instead was to drive back downtown and go on the backstage tour of the Ryman Auditorium instead.

Almost like Groundhog Day, we took the expressway back up and around over to downtown with the usual traffic and the crazy people driving. I ended up taking a long way around partly for forgetting where I was going and partly because I made a wrong turn or rather missed a turn I needed to take. But we finally got downtown. We found a parking lot really close to the auditorium and parked about a block away. We walked over to the Ryman Auditorium and got our tickets. We took the self guided tour of the auditorium, but we started with a short video on the second floor first. The video was very well done that included various projections and multi layered screens and TVs explaining the history of the building.



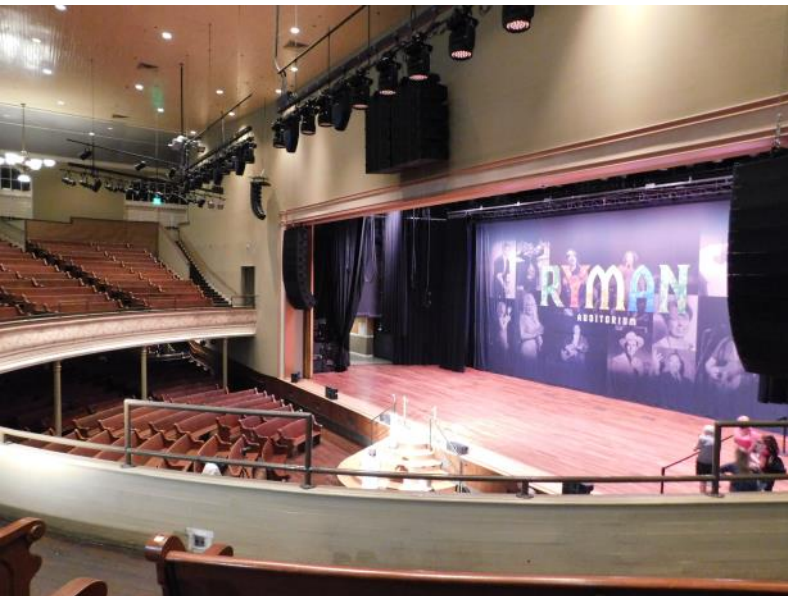
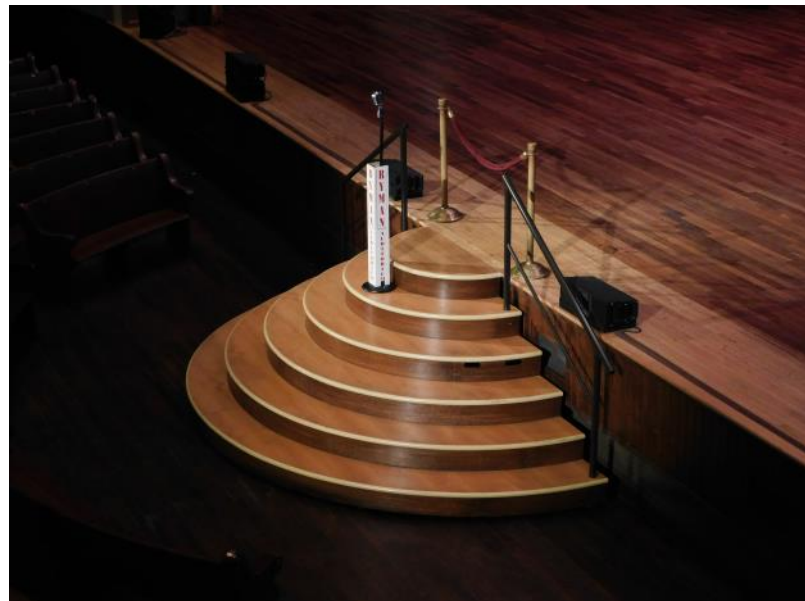

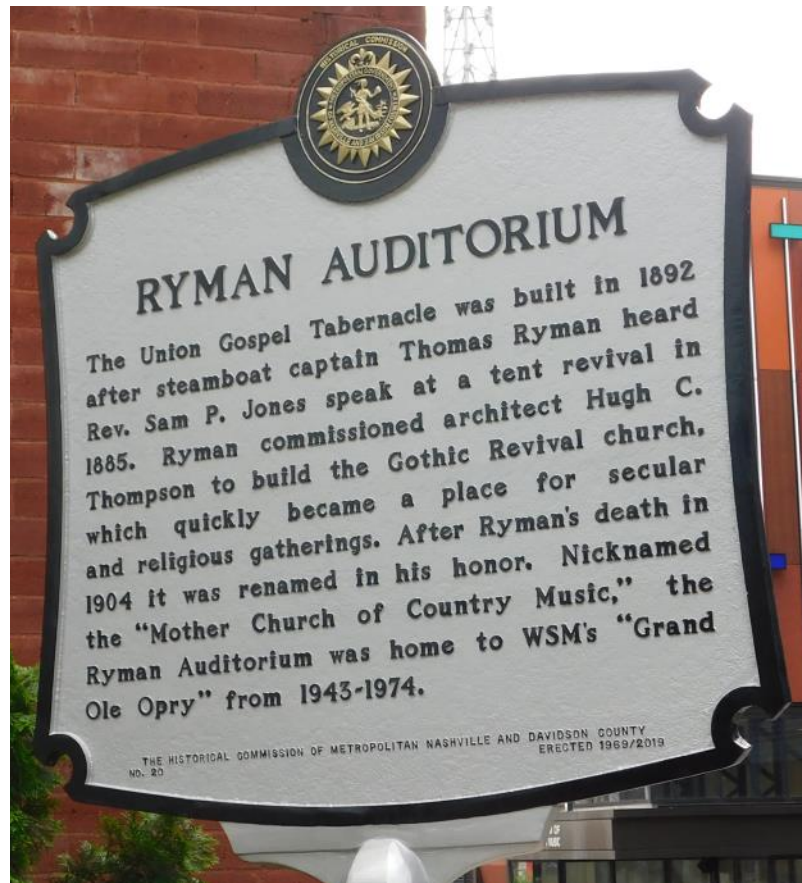

LITTLE JIMMY DICKENS
1920 - 2015

Little Jimmy Dickens first debuted on the Ryman stage in 1948 and went on to become one of the longest tenured and most beloved members of the Grand Ole Opry. His rhinestone-studded outfits, wild novelty hits, and infectious country humor captured the hearts of millions. A member of the Opry for 49 years (1948-1957 & 1975-2015), Dickens was one of the Opry's greatest ambassadors and a mentor for new generations of performers. His deep reverence for the Opry was best stated by the man himself: "The circle can't be broken."

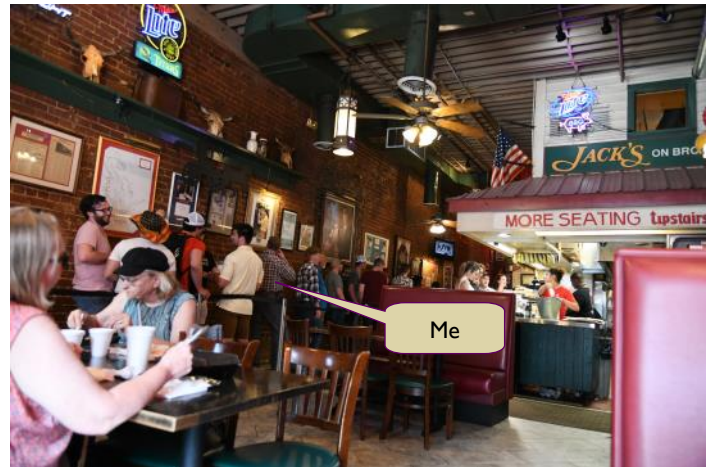

Since we were downtown and near Broadway, we decided that we wanted to try Jack's BBQ located on Broadway. I went and put our stuff in the car, or more like tried to put the stuff in the car, but I didn't have the fob. I also need to renew the parking meter for the time we would eat. We walked and turned the corner onto Broadway, and Broadway was just as crazy and loud and just as in your face as it had been every time we were there! We went down about half a block and there was Jack's barbecue. (We saw the place on the bus tour.) There was a long line even out the door, but we looked at the menu, and I decided on a brisket sandwich with coleslaw and a drink while Dad got the brisket plate with mashed potatoes and gravy, corn, and a drink. They had various barbecue sauces, and I went with the Kansas City barbecue sauce which was really good. I bought a bottle before we left. We went as far as Knoxville with just a little bit of traffic at one point, but otherwise, we kept going. Southeast of Knoxville, we turned onto US 441 a little after 8:15 PM. We continued southeast and stopped at one point at a gas station for gas. Once we reached Sevierville, we went south to Pigeon Forge which was not far away. Along US 441 in this area is a string of three towns: Sevierville, Pigeon Forge, and Gatlinburg. We got into Pigeon Forge around 9:15 PM. 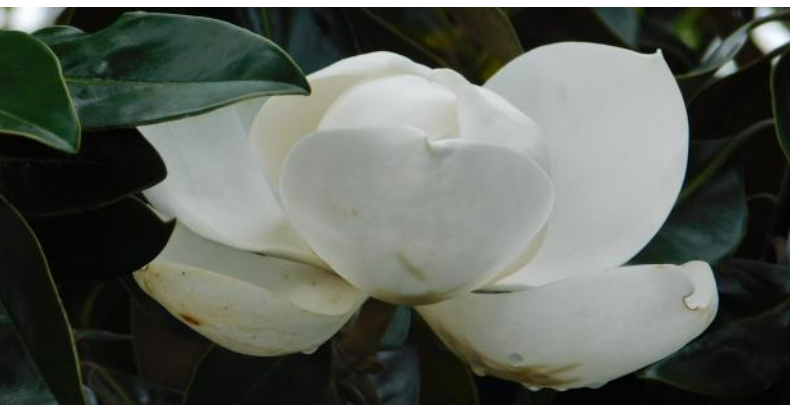
